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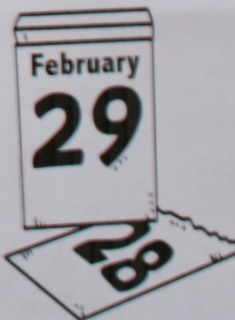

- Run off the middle bookmark section on a variety of colors of construction paper.
- Using a paper cutter, cut them apart.
- Do not cut the top and bottom blank areas of the bookmark off, so that students will have a "tab" to glue their picture squares on.
- Choose either the full-color, or the black and white "color me" bookmark pictures.
- Children can simply put one on the top of their bookmark, or mix and match, choosing a rectangle for the top and one for the bottom.
- Have students analyze the list of dates that leap years occurred in the past.
- Using that data, ask them to venture a guess as to when they think that the next leap year will be.
- Leap years generally occur every 4 years, so I keep it simple for my PK kiddos and kinders, and only go into the exceptions to the rule, with older grades who are familiar with 3 digit numbers.
- So that you can continue to use this packet, I've included center bookmarks through 2028, and will continue to up-date.
