- This is another booklet option. You can do this with more fluent readers, or do the other booklet first, then later assign this one as well.
- This could also be used as homework following the in-class illustrated one.
- Students read the sentences (filled with over 40 Dolch sight words), add end punctuation (period, question mark, exclamation point), then illustrate and color the page. They trim and collate the pages, then staple into a "just the right size" booklet.
- I've included an extra 9th page. Children complete the sentence: The wind also blew . . ." and add their own idea.
- For those of you who read the book "The Wind Blew", by Pat Hutchins, I've also included another optional page as well, which covers 4 more objects that the wind blew, so the all of the items in her story are represented.

- It's a simple rhyming book, with wonderful illustrations.
- I purposely did not number this booklet page, so that you can insert it wherever. Simply have students number the 4 small pages appropriately.
- For more practice, when everyone is done, read the booklet as a whole group to reinforce the words and cover concepts of print.



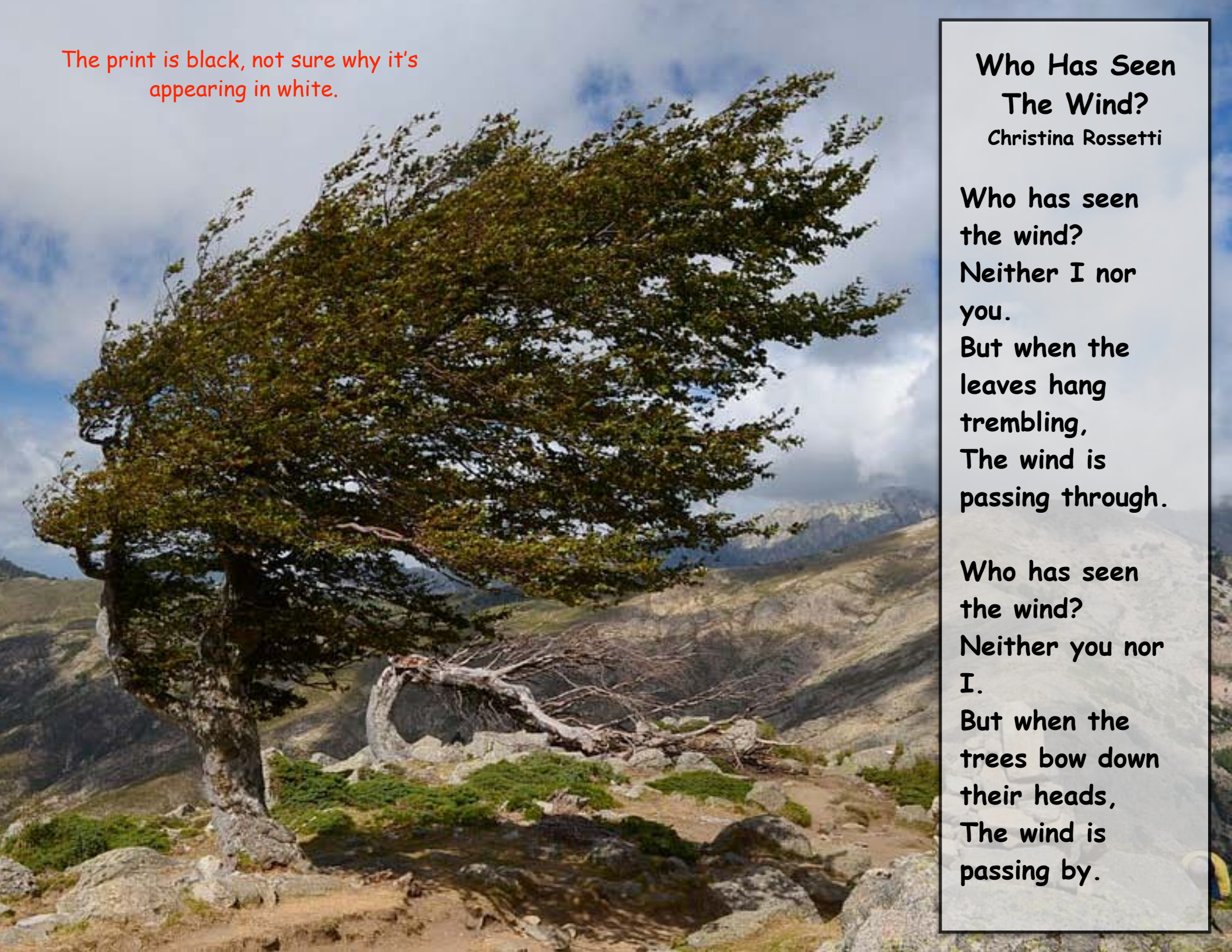

Synonyms on the front

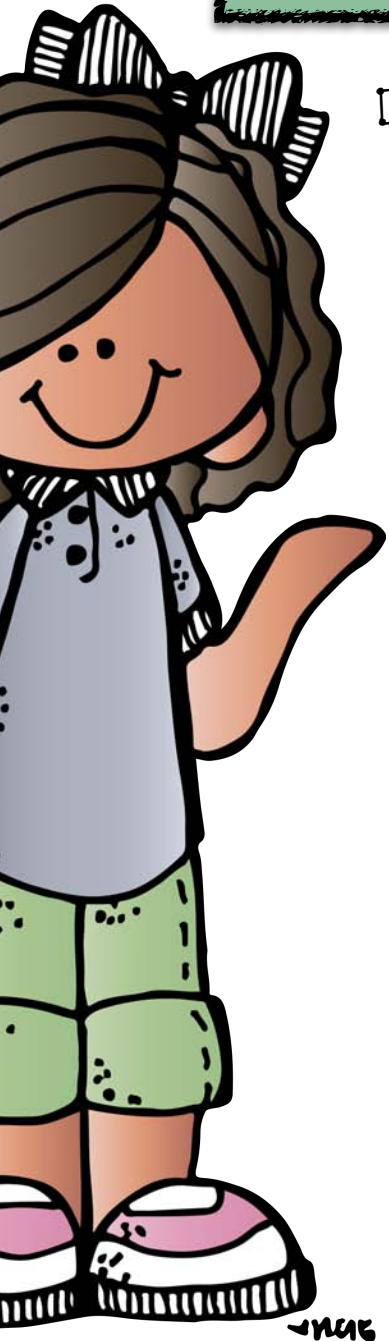


Antonyms on the back
