Directions For Horton Hears A Who TP Tube Pop Up Puppet.

Run off the elephant (Horton) on gray construction paper. Because of copyright laws I did not draw the "real" Horton.

Cut 2 slits on either side of the nose so you can insert the trunk-tab into the toilet paper tube.

Cover the back of the trunk with glue before you slide it in, and then pinch and press to make sure it stays put.

To expedite things, you can pre-wrap toilet paper tubes with gray paper.

This is a nice fine motor skill, so if you have the time, it's nice if children can do their own.

Students glue a stripe down one edge of the paper and then stick it to the tp tube and roll it. Add more glue on that end.

I tell students to pinch it with their fingers for a minute so it sticks. I also add a piece or two of Scotch tape for reinforcement.

You can also have children bring their tube to you and you can staple the paper on.

Children cut out their elephant and color the tusks white to add a bit of pizzazz.

For even more pizzazz add two wiggle eyes with glue dots.

Run off and rough cut, the clover with the little poem inside on pink construction paper.

Students cut out their clover "flower" and tape a green pipe cleaner on the back, after they have curled the end.

I fastened a mini white pom pom for the "dust speck" but you could also use a little piece of cotton ball.

I stuck this on to the front of Horton's tp "trunk" with a glue dot.

Tape or glue-dot 2 Popsicle sticks end to end.

Because of copyright I did not make a page of Whos. You can click on the link and check out the Whoville characters you want and then just copy and paste and then make them smaller, right in your Word doc.

Color your who, trim and glue dot to the end of the Popsicle stick. I chose this girl from Whoville, because she had a feather on her head, so I added a feather for that finishing touch.

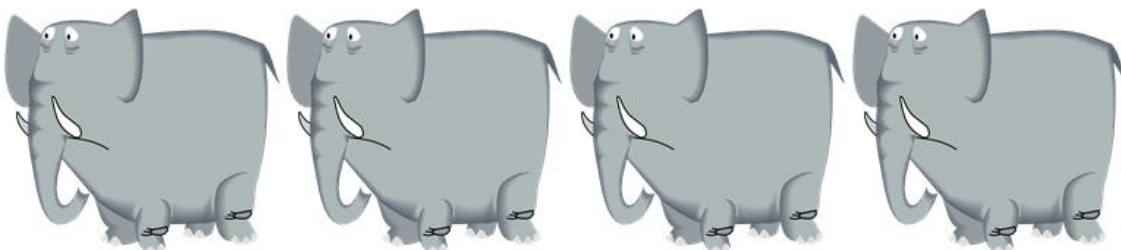
Children can manipulate their puppets to all sorts of spatial directions: "Poke your Who up, down, out, in etc. The Who is between the elephant's eyes.

You can also have them manipulate Horton and place him above their head, behind their back, in their left hand, in their right hand etc.

If you don't want to fuss with the tp puppet aspect of Horton, you can use him for writing prompt "Trunk Tales."

I've included several templates for that. Using Horton as a topper on a paper, makes these an adorable bulletin board.
