

Materials:


- Orange & green construction paper
- Crayons
- Staples
- Scissors
- Glue stick


Directions:

- 1. Run off masters, (eyes & pumpkin on orange c. paper, words on copy paper); I have included one with a face for younger students. pre cut green stems.
- 2. Children cut out their pumpkin.
- 3. Children glue stem to the back of the top of the pumpkin.
- 4. Children cut out their pumpkin eye pages and sequence.
- 5. Children cut out their word strips and glue them on the back of the page that will be next to the shape that they are reading.
- 6. i.e. they glue the rectangle words to the back of the cover page because their rectangle eyes are the first shape page, and on their right.
- 7. To help them with this, have them match the numbers on the word pages on the left, to the numbers on the shape pages on the right.
- 8. Write name on the top of the pumpkin, above cover.
- 9. Staple booklet to pumpkin so that it fits over the eye-part of his face.
- 10. Children draw their favorite pumpkin eyes on the pumpkin along with a nose and mouth. We color them in YELLOW so they're "glowing".
- 11. As a math extension I graph everyone's favorite eyes.
- 12. Add some color to the pumpkin with crayons. I also have them TRACE all of the eye shapes with a black crayon.
- 13. After everyone is finished, we go to our *Circle of Friends* carpet and read our booklet as a whole group.
- 14. I also encourage my students to read and share their booklet with their families when they get home.
- 15. I put a note in my newsletter, that we've been working on reading and math skills and making booklets, and that I need their help reinforcing their child's lessons, so "Please ask your child to read and share their booklets and praise their efforts."
- 16. I also make a laminated pumpkin and put Velcro for eyes and then laminate the eye pages and cut the shapes out and Velcro the backs.
- 17. I hang the pumpkin on my white board and put the pieces in a Zip lock.
- 18. During story and singing time we say: "Surprise! Surprise! My pumpkin has eyes. I call on a student to fill in the blank and they come up and put the eyes on the Velcro.
- 19. We keep chanting the phrase 'til all the shapes have been used.
- 20. It's a fun way to review shapes and the children LOVE playing!
