

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
Emgerbread Graph




Graph With Mr. Gingerbread

Listening and following directions:

- 1. Color the hearts pink.
- 2. Color the squares green.
- 3. Color the rectangles blue.
- 4. Color the circles purple.
- 5. Color the triangles orange.
- 6. Count each of the shapes.
- 7. Color the shape in the graph box the correct color.
- 8. Using that shape's color, put the correct number of X's in the boxes for as many shapes as you counted.
- 9. For example, I colored the triangles orange, so I will color my graph box triangle orange and I will mark an X in two boxes with an orange crayon because there are 2 triangles in the picture.
- 10. Fill up the entire box with your X.
- 11. Color the hat yellow
- 12. Color his nose light pink.
- 13. TRACE the gingerbread man brown.
- 14. Write your name on the bottom of the paper.





Graph With Mr. Gingerbread

Listening and following directions:

- 1. Color the hearts pink.
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Sm. Med. Lg. Symmetry G. Men

Materials:

- Brown construction paper
- Scissors
- Stickers
- White Puffy paint
- Optional: red or green 1/4 inch satin ribbon or yarn.

Optional Materials for med. G. man

• Crinkling roller hand-held machine

Materials for mini g. men ornaments:

- Same as above +
- Red & green puffy paint
- Flat-back jewels
- School photo


Directions for large one:

- 1. Make a template or run off on a Duplo.
- 2. Fold the construction paper.
- 3. Remind children to keep the paper FOLDED.
- 4. We review the word symmetry.
- 5. Children cut on the black lines and tad ah! They have a gingerbread. I love how amazed they are by this! ☺
- 6. I have an assortment of circle star and heart stickers and encourage them to make an ABAB pattern of 6 buttons on the gingerbread.
- 7. They then can use whatever other stickers they want to make eyes, nose, cheeks, and decorations on the feet and hands of the gingerbread man.
- 8. *Heads Up:* Make sure you tell the children that they are to make a FACE on the man and not just cover him with stickers.
- 9. Even after several reminders, I still have a few Y5's going crazy and putting 20+ stickers helter skelter all over the gingerbread man.
- 10. When they are done, they bring him to me.
- 11.I staple a bow at the neck.


- 12.In the past, I found those little Christmas light bulbs on a bolt at 75% off. I cut a 10-bulb string and stapled it from hand to hand so that it dangled in front of the gingerbread. It was adorable.
- 13. Using white puffy paint as "frosting" I write their name across the front and add hair and squigglies on the arms and legs.
- 14. This really adds the finishing touch. Set aside to dry.
- 15. You can hang them from the ceiling back-to-back or cover a b. board with aluminum foil and staple them kitty wampus on the big cookie sheet. "Catch us if you can! We're fast learners!"
- 16.I have also include a MEDIUM and SMALL master for you.


IDEAS for Small and Medium G. Men:


- 1. You can have the children decorate these with stickers too and glue one to the left hand of the large one and one to the right, Or glue them in order of size, starting with the large one and ending with the small one.
- 2. I have my students decorate the medium one with crayons then they use their fine motor skills to run their G. Man through "Mr. Cruncher Muncher."
- 3. It's one of my "must have" tools for my classroom. Print the 40% off coupon that Hobby Lobby always has on line, or clip the 50% off one item coupon that Michaels runs in the paper, and buy a "crinkler". They run about \$18.
- 4. It's a hand-held roller machine. You insert a piece of paper, the children turn the crank and the paper comes out looking like corrugated cardboard!
- 5. I use it once each month for a cool-looking center activity.
- 6. The children LOVE coming to this center and cranking away!
- 7. I use the small g. man as an ornament to decorate our tree. They put eyes on it, and glue their school photo to the tummy.
- 8. They bring it to me and I add "frosting" with puffy paint. They pick out a flat-backed jewel and we attach that to the bottom left of their picture with a glue dot.
- 9. I also use puffy paint to add a bit of green and red holly. When they dry, I tuck them in our slim standing Christmas tree, and it's instantly decorated. ☺
- 10.I've also made an extra sheet of g. men with faces in that I've used some years for you to use as well.

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Gingerbread Paper Bag.

Materials:

• Brown paper grocery bags.

I pre-plan for this activity and bag all my groceries in brown paper bags during the month of November. I send them home with a volunteer to trace and cut so all the children have to do is paint.

- White, red, black, and green paint.
- Brushes & Q-tips
- Stapler
- Christmas ribbon
- Tissue
- Something to hold paint like shallow candy cups and 6 inch paper plates.

Directions:


Prep:

- Trace and Cut 2 gingerbread men for each child.
- Staple all around them except for the head so that you can stuff them.
- Write children's name on them.

The next day:

- 1. Call students to their table via the name.
- 2. They turn over their man and paint it.
- 3. Remind them that they are "frosting" their gingerbread man, not painting all over him. Leave a brown edge so it looks like a frosted cookie.
- 4. I demonstrate from start to finish what I want them to do, and I still have a few little ones paint their entire man white!
- 5. I put the white paint in a shallow candy cup placed on a 6 inch paper plate, and a dollop of red, green and black on a 6 inch plate (3 plates per long table.)
- 6. They paint the white with brushes and the other colors with Q-tips.
- 7. Set aside to dry.
- 8. When dry, children crumple up tissue; help them gently stuff their gingerbread man.
- 9. Staple the head shut.
- 10. Glue Dot a ribbon bow at the neck.
- 11. I take advantage of all the before and after Christmas sales at *Jo Ann Fabrics, Hobby Lobby and Michaels* when their ribbon is 50% 80% off and buy several bolts in various widths for my Christmas crafts.
- 12. You can tie with yarn and hang from the ceiling, but the children really ask to take them home.
- 13. We do the *Gingerbread Pokey* before I have them put them in their lockers. (See words.)

Christmas Stamp Painted Door Knob Banner

Materials:

- <u>5 ½ x 18 banners</u> I get wallpaper sample books or fabric sample books from curtain/upholstery stores. They usually give them free. The most I've ever had to pay was \$2.00 per book. They are perfect for using to make banners and die-cuts for projects! You could also use felt or simply construction paper.
- Foam-Rubber Christmas stamps. Both Hobby Lobby and Michaels carry a nice selection. Here I use <u>gingerbread</u>. I wanted a <u>bow</u> stamp for the top and a <u>holly</u> stamp for the bottom corner for the finishing touch. Make up your own design to fit whatever stamps you find.
- Red, brown, green paint or whatever colors fit your stamps.
- Brushes
- Paper plates to put paint on.
- Hole punch
- Pipe cleaners to use to hang banner on door knob.
- Marker to write name on back.

Directions:

Prep:

- Punch hole and put pipe cleaners in all of the banners.
- Set up painting table. No need for paint shirts because I'm helping. At other times I let them do the whole thing and then they need shirts.
- I do this project as a center on our Christmas Party Theme Day.

The Next Day:

- 1. Call children to center.
- 2. Write their name on the back of the banner with a marker. I also include the year.
- 3. You pat (red) paint on the (bow) stamp and hand it to them.
- 4. They press it onto their banner.
- 5. Do another color (brown) and another stamp (gingerbread) and they press it onto their banner.
- 6. I review that we are doing things VERTICALLY.
- 7. Finally, I do the last color (green) to the (holly) stamp. I also have berries on this one, so I dab on red too. They press it in the corner.
- 8. We hold it up for all to see the fantastic job, and then they take it to the drying area to dry.
- 9. I use the paint that comes in the little round bottles that *Jo Ann Fabrics, WalMart, Hobby Lobby and Michael's* all sell for .59cents to \$1.89 depending on the colors I need.
- 10. I buy the bigger bottles of the rainbow colors because I use so much. They range in price from \$2.00-\$4.00.
- 11. These paints are great because they dry in about 5 minutes and have a huge variety of colors to choose from. Wash up is easy, but the permanency on projects is better.
- 12. After they are dry we wrap them up in tissue as one of the gifts the children give to their parents.

Gingerbread Painting.

Materials:

- White, red, green paint
- Brushes
- 12 x 24 brown construction paper
- Master
- *Optional*: red or plaid Christmas ribbon, opalescent glitter, white puffy paint.

Directions:


- 1. Make a template and trace the gingerbread man.
- 2. Have students trace the figure with white paint. While this is still wet I sprinkle the opalescent glitter on it and then they continue to paint the rest.
- 3. Paint black raisin eyes, a red smile, & dots for cheeks plus green buttons. I find little ones do better if you give them a Q-tip for this portion of the painting, other wise their eyes etc. get too bit. Still adorable tho'.
- 4. Set aside to dry.
- 5. I write their names with white puffy paint. It looks just like frosting!
- 6. For a bit of pizzazz, and add a red or Christmas plaid ribbon bow stapled at the neck. I think a bit of 3-D on children's work really adds that "wow!" affect.
- 7. I plan for this activity, so when Jo Ann Fabrics, Michaels and Hobby Lobby deep discount their Christmas Ribbon at 75% or more, I buy the big roll.
- 8. I send the bolt home with a parent volunteer who makes the bows up ahead of time so all I have to do is staple them.
- 9. Painting on brown paper really gives things a different look, as we always seem to paint on white paper so the children get an extra kick out of this.
- 10. For a quick bulletin board, cover with aluminum foil.
- 11. Cut a 2 inch edge around the gingerbread men and staple them to the "cookie sheet"! I have a volunteer do this as the children tend to cut straight up to the white edge no matter how many directions I give them or samples I show them.
- 12. Caption: "Catch us if you can! We're fast learners!"
- 13. You could also punch a hole in the top and hang them back-to-back from the ceiling.
- 14. Or give each child a 14 x 25 piece of tag board covered in aluminum foil to glue their own gingerbread man on, and hang up in rows on the wall in the hall or back-to-back from the ceiling.

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Gingerbread Puzzle On A Roll

Directions:

- 1. Run off 2 masters for each child. One to cut & color, and one to use as a grid.
- 2. Children COLOR their gingerbread man on just their puzzle.
- 3. Students CUT out their pieces.
- 4. Remind them that their puzzle will only fit together as good as they cut.
- 5. Children choose a partner.
- 6. Roll dice to see who goes first; highest number wins.
- 7. When child rolls a 1 they get to put that piece down on their grid.
- 8. If they already have rolled that number then they pass the dice to their partner without doing anything.
- 9. Play continues 'til they have completed their puzzle.
- 10. You can have them glue their pieces down, or have them take them home, paper clipped to their grid, so they can play it again with their family.
- 11.I have also made these kinds of 6-piece puzzles with seasonal cards that I find on sale.
- 12. They usually come in a boxed set so I have enough for a class set.
- 13. Measure one card so you have the 6 pieces as a measuring tool, Trace with a black pen, number the pieces, laminate them, then cut them out and put each individual puzzle card in a Ziploc baggy, so you can use them each year.
- 14. I have a class set for Halloween, Thanksgiving, and several for Christmas and January (snowmen) + Valentine's Day.



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Gingerbread Sparkle Cookies On Aluminum Foil

Materials:

- Aluminum foil
- Card Stock or Tag Board
- Scissors
- White Glue
- Opalescent glitter
- Black Marker
- Light Brown Construction Paper
- White Paint
- Rubber Sponge Stamps that look like cookies (I bought mine at Michaels)
- Gingerbread Sponge Stamp (I bought mine at Michaels)
- A few wipes

Directions:

<u>Prep</u>:

- Pre-cut 8 ½ x 6 ½ pieces of card stock or tag board.
- Wrap them in aluminum foil, shiny side up.
- Set up a painting center. (Table, paper plate with white paint, brush, cookie stamps, paper plates to rest them in, opalescent glitter, a plate to sprinkle it on, pen to write names, wipes, light brown construction paper.)
- I set this up at a table and run it as a one-on-one "earned" center with me
- i.e., If I <u>catch</u> you being good...you can walk-walk as fast as you can, come work with me and we'll make a gingerbread man. © There's no need for a paint shirt because I'm dabbing on the paint.
- Call students up.
- Write their name on the brown paper.
- Pat a good amount of white paint on the stamp.
- Children press it down on the brown paper and lift it straight up.
- Do another stamp.
- We do 5-6. Give them guidance with spacing.
- Sprinkle with glitter.
- Shake off excess.

- Set aside to dry.
- When dry, children cut out their cookies. I do this in the afternoon.
- Demonstrate and show them that they need to leave an EDGE <u>around</u> their shape so that it will look like a frosted cookie.
- You will have to repeat this several times, and show them your cookie, plus check your students' cutting progress, because if your little ones are like mine, you will have mutilated cookies with no edges.
- They raise their hand when they are done cutting. Give them a prewrapped aluminum foil "cookie sheet".
- Write their name in the corner with a marker.
- Put 5-6 drops of white glue on their cookie sheet, and have them place their cookies on the glue drops on the foil sheet.
- Set aside to dry.
- You can hang them on a bulletin board this way, or you can mount them in various positions on a variety of colored construction paper.
- I type up the following poem in big letters and put it in the middle of my bulletin board.
- I have also put the poem on my students' mini construction paper boards too.

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Gingerbread Tummy Time Clock

Materials:

- Brown construction paper (Scraps: pink & black)
- Brass brads
- Glue stick
- Crayons
- Scissors
- Protractor
- Yarn
- Masters
- Optional: Glue dots
- *Optional:* Wiggle eyes
- **Optional:** White puffy paint


Directions:

Prep: Make and cut out clock hands, nose, & cheeks.

Run off masters

- 1. Students cut out their gingerbread man.
- 2. They can cut and glue cheeks and nose, or they can color them.
- 3. They can color in a mouth and eyes, or you can glue on wiggle eyes and use puffy paint for a mouth.
- 4. They can use white crayon for the "frosting" or you can use white puffy paint for the "frosting". I use puffy paint for mouth & frosting.
- 5. Children cut the circular clock and glue it to the middle.
- 6. Using a protractor, teacher pokes a hole in the hands and clock.
- 7. I have the clock hands pre-cut. (I also pre cut nose & cheeks.)
- 8. Children fasten the hands with a brad to their clock.
- 9. Children write their name under the clock.
- 10. Complete and assemble the clock before you use puffy paint.
- 11. Set aside to dry.
- 12. After the clocks are dry, I whole group assess.
- 13. We play "Beat The Teacher's Clock" Who's faster than Mrs. Henderson's gingerbread man? It's a game I made up.
- 14.I say the time, or show them the NUMBER (digital time) that I want them to make on their clock.
- 15. The first one to hold up their clock with the correct time is the winner.
- 16. As a math extension, you could graph when you'd like a gingerbread snack. In the morning for breakfast, in the afternoon for lunch, or in the evening before you go to bed.

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10 In A Gingerbread Bed


Materials:

- 9x12 Light brown, red, orange, yellow, blue, purple & green construction paper.
- 12 x 18 Dark brown and white construction paper.
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- Crayons
- Masters


Directions:


- 1. Run off masters.
- 2. Children cut out the cloud.
- 3. Glue colored shapes to the cloud. I have these pre-cut.
- 4. You can leave them plain, but they look adorable "frosted" in white puffy paint, or outlined with white glue and then sprinkled with white glitter.
- 5. I have the children do these first and write their name on the back.
- 6. We set them aside to dry, so by the time they are finished with everything else these are dry and can be put on their beds.
- 7. Pass out story sheets.
- 8. Children TRACE the numbers.
- 9. Children cut out their word wall words and glue them to their story sheets.
- 10. Girls cut and glue SHE to the end, boys, HE. Y5's and younger, WRITE their name in the blank.
- 11.I tell my students to cut one word out at a time and glue it to the appropriate number so that they don't lose these little squares or get them mixed up with their table mates.
- 12. Pass out 12 x 24 sheets of brown paper.
- 13. Glue the "story" to the middle of the paper.
- 14. I've made complete stories for Y5 and younger and "word-wall" fill-in stories for Kindergarten +.
- 15. Pass out 9x15 white paper and the red and green squares.
- 16. I have red and green squares pre cut.
- 17. You could also cut strips this width, and have the children rip & tear "squares".

- 18. Glue red and green squares in an ABAB pattern onto the white paper. Remind them to leave a white space in between, above and below.
- 19. This is the top quilt. There will be 3 squares across.
- 20. They raise their hand; you scotch tape the top of their quilt (like a hinge) over their story so that it flips up.
- 21. Pass out titles. I have these pre-cut.
- 22. Glue title on the 3rd and 4th quilt lines.
- 23. Write your name on the bottom right hand square.
- 24. Children cut out bed posts. They glue the <u>right</u> one to the BACK of the brown paper "bed".
- 25. They glue only the bottom edge of the <u>left</u> one to the top of the quilt, so that it flips down so the gingerbread strip slides through.
- 26. I also have the gingerbread strips pre-cut.
- 27. Children snip the edge and glue the strips to the appropriate numbered strip.
- 28. Add crayon details to the faces, white frosting, and trace the numbers.
- 29. Children glue their cut out photo to the number 1 gingerbread.
- 30. Slip the number 10 end behind the bed post.
- 31. Glue the left side of the white cloud **behind** the left bed post and the right side to the **front** of the bed post.
- 32. You are now ready to chant the story and move your strip!
- 33. I review the "sugarplum" shapes and colors.
- 34. We name the colors in English and Spanish. We count in English and Spanish as well.
- 35. After we complete the story, we "blast off" to put our beds in our lockers.
- 36. To get the "wiggles" out and further reinforce the story I choose 10 kids to lie on the floor in a straight line, body-to-body.
- 37. We chant the song, they all roll once, the end child "falls off the bed", gets up and comes and joins me and the rest of the kids who are chanting, while the other children are rolling off the bed.
- 38. When all 10 have rolled off the "bed" the last one stretches, yawns and says "Good-night!"
- 39. Then I choose the other 10 'til all of my students have had a turn. They LOVE this activity!

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Gingerbread Patterned Paper Chain

Materials:

- Light brown, red & green construction paper
- Crayons
- Glue stick
- Scissors
- White puffy paint
- Hole punch
- Yarn
- Stapler


Directions:

PREP:

- Run off masters
- Cut red & green paper strips. I make them the width of a ruler and use a paper cutter to cut off the short end of a 9 x 12 sheet of construction paper. I cut 5 at a time.
- I also cut an additional 4 inch brown paper strip as I couldn't make the master connector link long enough.
- I have other gingerbread for my students to cut out that day, so I also have the gingerbread pre-cut.

The next day:

- 1. Children COLOR the gingerbread.
- 2. Children make a 6 to 10 piece PATTERN paper chain.
- 3. I have them choose between ABAB or AABB.
- 4. I use this as a whole group assessment tool.
- 5. Children bring their chain and colored gingerbread man to me.
- 6. I staple the additional brown strip to the connector and link their chain to this loop.
- 7. I write their name in green marker across the base of the front of the gingerbread man's arms.
- 8. Punch a hole in the top of the head, tie a yarn loop.
- 9. I put puffy paint "frosting" on the "loopy" parts of the gingerbread man.
- 10. We set aside to dry; hang from the ceiling or along a wall in the hallway.



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Gingerbread Pocket Head

Materials:

- Brown, peach or light pink, red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple and black construction paper.
- Brown paint
- Brushes
- White puffy paint
- 6 inch paper plates
- scissors
- glue stick
- stapler
- Masters
- Crayons
- Optional: Plaid ribbon

Directions:

- 1. Run off masters or make templates.
- 2. Write children's names on the front of the plates.
- 3. Call them to their table seat.
- 4. Children paint their ½ plate. Set aside to dry.
- 5. Clean up paint mess and pass out paper pieces, scissors and glue sticks.
- 6. Children cut out arms, head & shapes. I have the eyes, nose, hearts and paper plates pre-cut.
- 7. When plates are dry staple them to the circle.
- 8. Children glue hearts to top of plate and make a smile with a red crayon.
- 9. Glue nose to top center of plate.
- 10. Glue eyes above nose on circle.
- 11. Glue arms together. Fold in hands.
- 12. For older students, you can glue "right" and "left" words to the appropriate hands. This did not work for Y5's; they were looking at the g. man and wanted to glue them that way; it was too confusing for them.
- 13. Glue plate to arms.
- 14. Write name on left hand side.
- 15. Staple bow under chin.
- 16. Children bring to you, puffy paint hair and add dots to eyes.
- 17. While drying, children cut out their cookie shapes and number strips.
- 18. Accordion fold the number strips.
- 19. After reviewing shapes and numbers, tuck them into your gingerbread pocket.
- 20. You could also chant. "Crunch Munch what cookie shape should I feed my gingerbread man for lunch?" Then feed him a shape, and identify the color.




- 1. Make a template and trace it.
- 2. If you want the face of the gingerbread man, run him off on a duplo and have the children cut him out and glue him to the larger gingerbread.
- 3. Children cut out their gingerbread man.
- 4. Children color their gingerbread man.
- 5. I have the hearts pre-cut and depending on the number of letters in their name, I pass those hearts out to the children.
- 6. They either write the letters of their name on the heart, or cut and glue them.
- 7. I have them cut and glue letters, because I like reinforcing these skills and I think it looks better on this project.
- 8. I do all caps, to save on paper, but "heads up" your little ones will need assistance with this, as they are not used to seeing their lowercase letters in uppercase.
- 9. I tell them to try and cut their letters in a square shape, but they invariably cut them out every which way. They sort of look like a ransom note.
- 10. Children glue their hearts on the arms when they are done cutting and gluing the letters.
- 11.I assist with spacing. It helps if you glue the 1st and last heart and then place the others so you see the space needed, before you glue them.
- 12. For more pizzazz I add "frosting" with white puffy paint and staple on a ribbon bow at the neck.
- 13. When we are done, we hang on the wall, close to the ceiling, as a border in the hallway.
- 14. My caption under our border reads: Mrs. Henderson has some real smart cookies in her class. Some of the alphabet is missing! Spy! Spy! As fast as you can. Which letters aren't seen on our gingerbread man?
- 15.I haven't done it, but I think they would look cute hung back-to-back from the ceiling as well.

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Gingerbread Story Strips

Materials:

- Brown Construction paper
- White paper
- Scissors
- Glue stick


- 1. Run off masters
- 2. Children CUT out gingerbread man; you cut slits. I have the story strips pre-cut.
- 3. I also cut some tiny strips for the children to glue as "stoppers" on the ends of their story strip so they don't pull it out.
- 4. Children add some color with crayons.
- 5. After reading both "happy" and "sad" endings of the gingerbread fairy tale, have the children decide which version they like best.
- 6. We discuss that after all, eating a cookie is what a cookie was designed for. The children also bring up that the cookie shouldn't have run away, the cookie should have listened, and the cookie should not have talked to the fox who was a stranger, so he sort of "got what he deserved".
- 7. As a math extension, we graph which ending they liked the best. (I've included my clip art for you.)
- 8. Children choose the last story square (eaten or escaped) and glue that to their story strip.
- 9. Help the children insert their story strip into the slits.
- 10. Children glue a "stopper-strip" to the back of each end of their strip.
- 11. As a whole group, we "read & tell" the gingerbread tale once more, using our story strip manipulative.
- 12. A copy of how our story strip story goes is listed below.
- 13. I encourage the children to share them with their family when they get home.

- 14. I also include in my newsletters that when "Story Strips" come home, to help reinforce lessons, show their child that they care about what they are learning, and to build self-esteem and verbal acuity, would they please ask their child to retell stories using these adorable manipulatives that they have made at school.
- After you have retold the story, you can add white puffy paint so that it will look like real frosting! Set them aside to dry.


