
Mary Had A Little Lamb

The words of the American nursery rhyme *Mary Had A Little Lamb* appeal to small children and introduces simile (white as snow) as part of our English language.

The words also convey the hopeful adage that love is reciprocated! No specific historical connection can be traced to the words of *Mary Had a Little Lamb* but it can be confirmed that it is American, as the words were written by Sarah Hale, of Boston, in 1830.

An interesting historical note about this rhyme, is that the words were the first ever recorded by Thomas Edison, on tin foil, on his phonograph.
