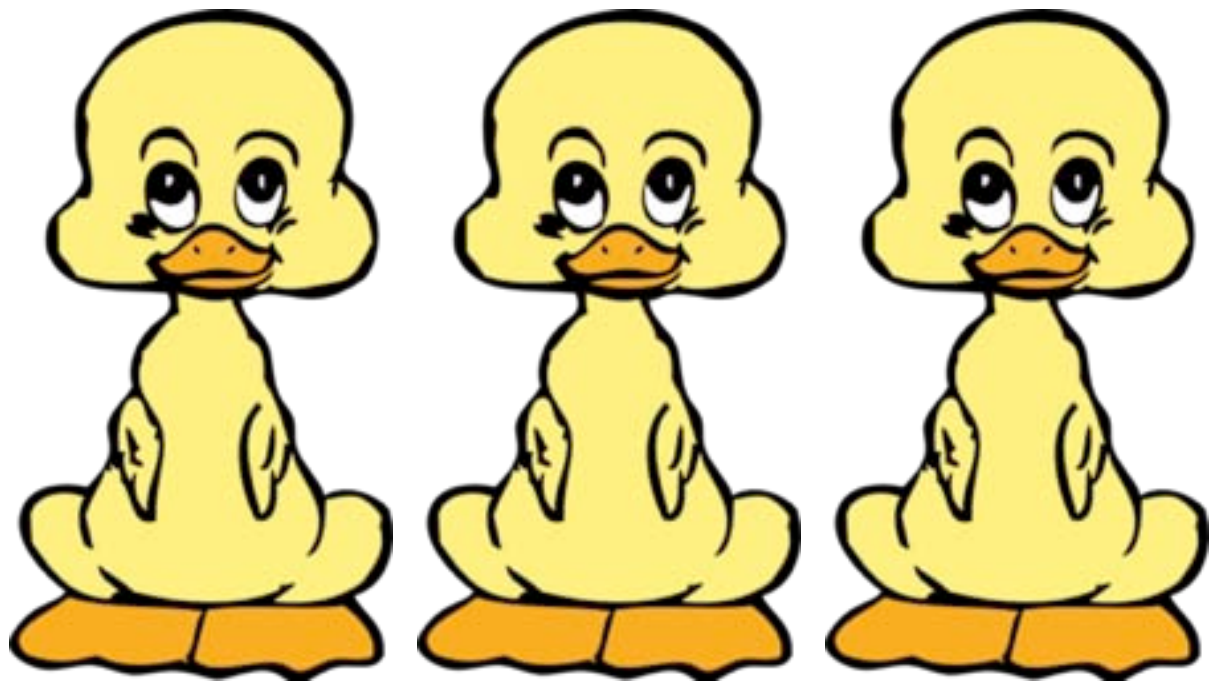

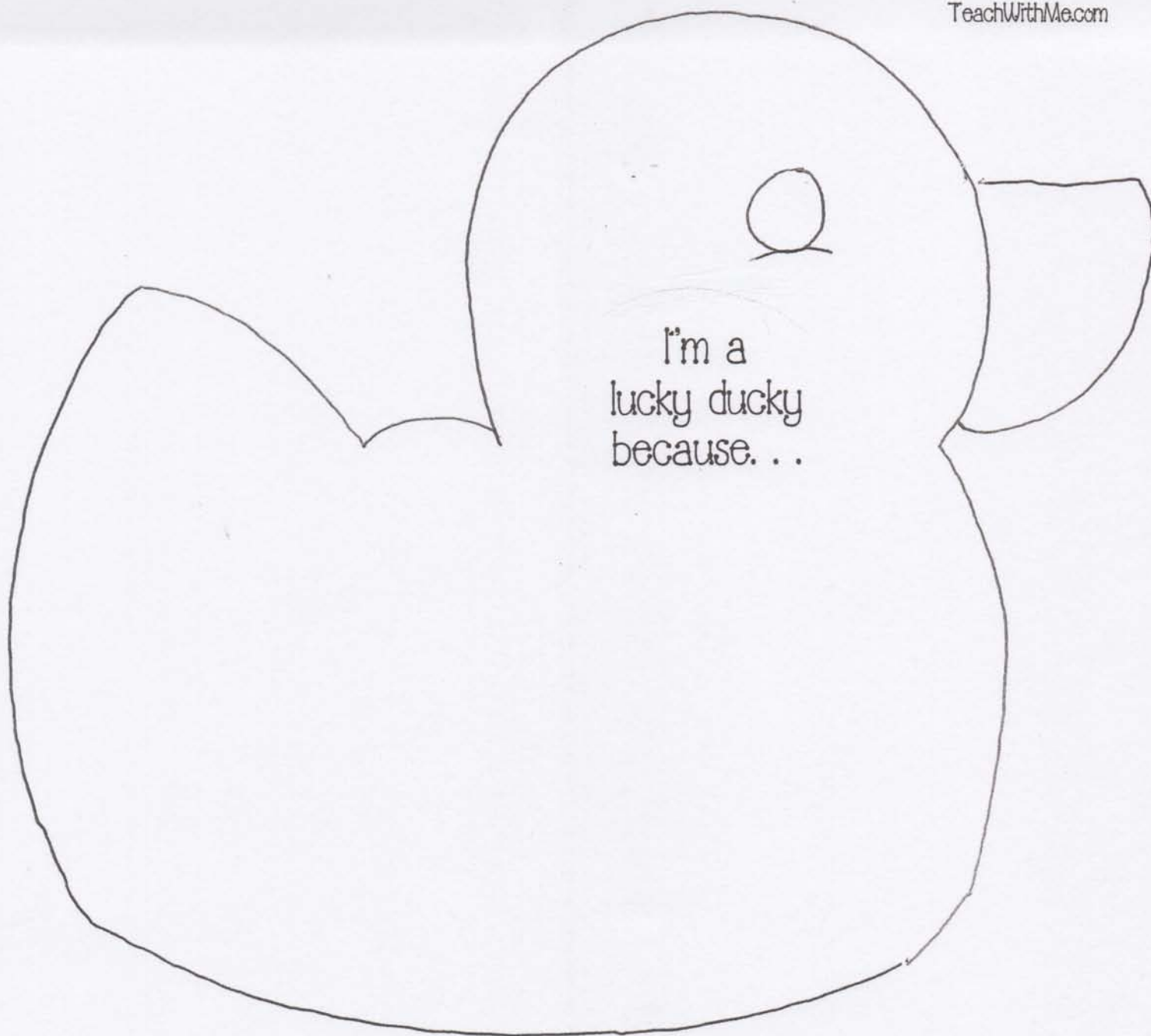
I have a family that

Run off the ducks on yellow construction paper.

Students cut them out and then write why they feel they are lucky.

In a discussion before hand, brainstorm why a person is lucky.

What things do they have that others who don't live in America, or who are poor, don't have etc.

For more pizzazz, add a wiggle eye, student photo, and a 3 dimensional beak.

Mount on a blue background bulletin board, so that the ducks look like they are swimming in a pond.

Add clouds to the sky.

Print off the Seuss Writing Prompt Poster.

Glue it to a sheet of pastel construction paper and put it in the middle of the board.

Add some toilet paper roll "cat tails" for a 3D effect + some pastel polka dot or striped boarder for that finishing touch.
